NATIONAL RECOVERY MONTH – SEPTEMBER 2020

WHEREAS, Behavioral health is an essential part of one's overall wellness; and WHEREAS, Prevention of mental and substance use disorders works, treatment is effective, and people recover in our area and around the nation; and

RESOLVED, this LGS-1 schedule supersedes and replaces any other schedule previously adopted by the County of Putnam. This resolution shall go into effect immediately and is expected to have no fiscal impact.

Legislator Nacerino stated that she believed all these appointments come as a recommendation from the County Executive. She believed that we could ascertain that answer very quickly for Legislator Montgomery as she expressed how this works in various departments; not only in Consumer Affairs. She believed Legislator Sullivan was trying to say, if a question was posed beforehand, we could have had the answer.

WHEREAS, the Physical Services Committee has reviewed and approved this request; now therefore be it

RESOLUTION #149

LEAD AGENCY/ SEQRA DETERMINATION/ STONELEIGH AVENUE/ DREWVILLE ROAD INTERSECTION RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT (PIN 8761.97)

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Legislature is considering the approval of a Putnam County Highways and Facilities project that involves the reconstruction of the intersection at Stoneleigh Avenue and Drewville Road, in the Town of Carmel, into a single lane roundabout (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Project is to, among other things, improve overall traffic conditions while reducing delays, allowing better access for emergency vehicles to the Putnam Hospital Center located approximately one-half mile south of the aforesaid intersection, such related reconstruction to include, without limitation, the construction of (i) a fill-type retaining wall on the western approach with significant grading on the eastern approach thereby allowing the road to be graded away from said intersection to provide a flatter approach as vehicles enter the roundabout, (ii) new drainage and stormwater systems, such stormwater improvements to include a new detention pond, modifications to an existing pond, dry swale, and hydrodynamic separators, and closed drainage improvements that will eliminate future erosion that continues to damage the existing shoulders of the intersection, and (iii) implementation of miscellaneous improvements to Project-area guiderails, signage, and landscaping, (collectively, the "Proposed Action"); and

WHEREAS, the Proposed Action is subject to review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") and the Regulations promulgated thereunder ("SEQRA 6 NYCRR Part 617"); and

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Legislature hereby declares its intent to act as the Lead Agency under the procedures and requirements of SEQRA; and

WHEREAS, a full Environmental Assessment form (EAF) has been prepared for the Project, along with supporting documentation, which is attached hereto and made a part hereof; and

WHEREAS, the Putnam County Legislature, after a review of SEQRA 6 NYCRR Part 617 *et seq.*, finds that the Proposed Action is an Unlisted action; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Putnam County Legislature will conduct a coordinated SEQRA environmental review for the Proposed Action in connection with the Project; and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

AUDIT & ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE (Chairman Castellano, Legislators Gouldman & Sayegh)

Item #6k – Approval Budgetary Amendment (20A046)/ Health Department/ Reorganization was next. Chairwoman Addonizio recognized Legislator Castellano, Chairman of the Audit & Administration Committee. On behalf of the members of the Committee, Legislators Gouldman and Sayegh, Legislator Castellano moved the following:

Legislator Castellano explained that the reorganization saved the taxpayer \$43,176 that has been placed back into contingency.

Legislator Montgomery questioned if there was any update on the epidemiologist. She stated that it has almost been a month since the Health Committee meeting, and we have been operating without an epidemiologist for quite some time.

Legislator Castellano believed that it was not part of the resolution in front of us right now.

Legislator Montgomery stated that part of the resolution is for a part time epidemiologist.

Legislator Castellano stated that the budgetary amendment is moving funds around to cover the cost of the reorganization.

Legislator Nacerino stated that she has not been apprised of anyone filling the position, however, that does not necessarily mean that it has not been. She believed that they do have someone in the acting capacity in the interim. She explained that she supports the transfer and the changes in the Health Department because, as demonstrated in the presentation, the changes that are being implemented will certainly be effective. There will also be a cost savings.

Legislator Montgomery stated that she supports the transfer and she believes that the epidemiologist is relevant to this discussion.

Legislator Nacerino stated that she could certainly find out what the status is on the epidemiologist position.

There was no other business submitted to the meeting.

Item #8 – Recognition of Legislators

Legislator Montgomery noted the Proclamation for National Recovery Month. She stated yesterday was International Opioid Overdose Awareness Day. She explained that it was a tough time for most people considering the challenges we are all facing. She stated that there was another tragedy this summer in Philipstown. She wanted people to be aware that there is help available. She mentioned the Behavioral Health Hub in the Town of Philipstown which is there to help individuals in crisis. She stated that the Town of Philipstown which is there to find AA and NA meetings. She stated that the Town of Philipstown has also handed out food vouchers to individuals in need. She encouraged individuals to call the Legislative Office at 845-808-1020 if they were in need and did not know where to go. She stated that she would walk individuals through the process of getting help and bring them to the Hub if necessary. She stated that she has also assisted her constituents with getting help with their unemployment applications. She expressed that people feel free to reach out to her.

Legislator Nacerino wished everyone a happy and safe Labor Day weekend. She explained that it was not a traditional back to school after Labor Day and it will be defined very differently this year. She wished all the children, faculty and staff a happy, successful, healthy and safe school year.

Legislator Sullivan thanked and acknowledged Legislators Castellano, Jonke and the Administration on the opening of Morningthorpe Bridge yesterday. He stated that it was a nice improvement for the Village of Brewster. He explained that he takes offense to the statement that the Legislature rubber stamps things. He explained that the Legislature works hard to be prepared for our meetings and ready to vote. He stated that nobody here is rubber stamping anything.

Legislator Sayegh explained that with the Anniversary of 9/11 approaching, she reminded everyone of the sacrifices our first responders make for us each and every day. She stated that of the 2,977 victims killed in the 9/11 attack, 343 were firefighters, 37 police officers from the NY Port Authority, 23 police officers from NYPD and 8 emergency

medical technicians and paramedics. She extended a special thank you all of our first responders who are on the front lines for us each and every day, protecting the safety of our citizens.

Chairwoman Addonizio explained the environmental impact of the single use COVID-19 PPEs. She stated that the majority of the masks are made of polypropylene which is a liquid resistant plastic base material. She stated that this type of material has a long life after being discarded; winding up in our oceans and endangering our marine life. She also asked everyone to break the elastic off of their masks before discarding. She stated that there have been birds and ducks recently found with the elastic wrapped around their legs. She suggested that a solution to this problem would be to use washable cloth masks, as it would help to reduce waste and protect the environment. She wished everyone a safe Labor Day weekend.
