July 23, 2020

The meeting was called to order via audio webinar at 6:04 P.M. by Chairwoman Sayegh who lead in the Pledge of Allegiance. Upon roll call Committee Members Addonizio, Albano, and Chairwoman Sayegh were present.

Item #3 - Approval of Minutes – May 12, 2020

The minutes were approved as submitted.

Item #4 - Discussion/COVID-19

- **Testing Delays and Travel Restrictions/Health Department**
- **FYI/Emergency Purchase of N95 Masks**

Chairwoman Sayegh noted that New York’s businesses were paused by the Governor on March 22, 2020. She stated this was to be a temporary measure, but it is still in place. She stated Putnam County has 22 active cases of COVID-19 as of July 16, 2020. She thanked the Health Department and the Administration for their tireless efforts during this pandemic. She stated the increase in cases in the southern states has caused testing delays in our community. She stated she has heard from some constituents who have had difficulty getting their test results back. She read an email from Dr. Jean Ralston, Senior Public Health Nurse, regarding the testing delays. She stated the Governor has issued travel restrictions on States that have surging numbers of COVID cases. She stated the rate of positivity in testing is an important indicator as a high positivity rate usually means only the sickest people are being tested, while a low rate means that the community is also testing asymptomatic people. She stated the World Health Organization reported countries that have extensive testing for COVID should have a rate of approximately 5% for at least 14 days. She stated Putnam County currently has a 0.9% positivity rate. She stated she has asked Putnam County Economic Development Corporation (EDC) President Kathleen Abels to speak on how this pandemic and the travel restrictions are affecting summer travel.

EDC President Abels stated New York has had great success slowing the spread of COVID-19. She stated Putnam County is exceptionally safe. She stated on June 24, 2020 Governor Cuomo announced the quarantine requirements for travelers from certain areas, in order to maintain the low positivity in the State. She stated there are additional protocols for essential workers. She stated there are forms that travelers need to fill out when they arrive. She noted that it is illegal for a cop to pull over a car for having an out of state license plate. She stated people who break quarantine could face a \$10,000 fine.

Chairwoman Sayegh questioned how the quarantine will be enforced.

EDC President Abels stated all points of entry will be monitored. She noted that some airlines have enhanced their ventilation and have kept the middle seat vacant.

Legislator Albano stated he has noticed sign in sheets in some businesses. He questioned if this is required.

EDC President Abels stated it depends on the industry. She stated it is considered “best practice,” but not mandated. She noted she has heard of some people putting down false information when signing in.

Legislator Addonizio requested clarification on the enforcement.

EDC President Abels stated it is mainly tracked through complaints to the Health Department.

Legislator Montgomery questioned if there would be more COVID-19 related discussion because she has questions not for EDC President Abels. She questioned where more information on enforcing travel restrictions can be found.

EDC President Abels stated she believes the enforcement process is evolving.

Chairwoman Sayegh thanked EDC President Abels for the update. She reviewed the backup material that was provided for informational purposes, including a memorandum from Purchasing Director Alessandro Mazzotta regarding the purchase of N95 masks.

Legislator Montgomery stated the vendor of the masks is not indicated. She questioned if the vendor is known.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated the Purchasing Department has that information.

Legislator Montgomery questioned if there is anyone from the Purchasing Department on the webinar.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated no, this memorandum was included for informational purposes.

Legislator Montgomery questioned if there is anyone from the Health Department on the webinar.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated there is not, they were not available tonight.

Legislator Montgomery stated she has additional questions for the Health Department regarding future preparedness. She stated she sent a memorandum yesterday regarding the resignation of the Health Department’s Epidemiologist, who also serves as the Public Health Educator. She stated this is a great loss of expertise in major areas. She stated she would like to hear from the Health Department on this subject.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated it was not possible for it to be addressed at this meeting. She added that it will be discussed at a future meeting.

Legislator Montgomery stated she has COVID related questions that she would like to read into the record so they may be answered at a later date. She questioned how the County will properly respond, prepare, and analyze COVID data without a trained epidemiologist on staff. She questioned how the Health Department will maintain proper communication.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated this is not the time to discuss personnel issues.

Legislator Sullivan stated the COVID numbers in Putnam County, and the Mid-Hudson region, have been extremely low. He stated this is not an emergency right now and not the big issue it was a few months ago. He stated he believes there are people in the Health Department designated to take over the Epidemiologist and the Public Health Educator positions. He stated he knows there is another Epidemiologist on staff. He suggested calling individual departments when a Legislator has questions and leave the Committee meetings for addressing significant issues.

Legislator Montgomery stated Legislators cannot freely call departments.

Item #5 - Approval/Appointment/Putnam County Mental Health Community Services Board/Baumann

Chairwoman Sayegh stated this appointment is filling a vacancy.

Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to move Approval/Appointment/Putnam County Mental Health Community Services Board/Baumann to the Full Legislative meeting; Seconded by Legislator Albano. All in favor.

Item #6 - Approval/Budgetary Amendment 20A037/Department of Social Services/Reflects Spending Adjustment Request approved by NYS Office of Victim Services for the period October 1, 2019 through September 30, 2020

Commissioner of Social Services Michael Piazza stated additional space has been being looked at for the Child Advocacy Center. He stated this Budgetary Amendment will be used for renovation.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated she believes this is the remainder of a grant that was not used.

Commissioner Piazza stated that is correct.

Legislator Albano made a motion to move Budgetary Amendment 20A037 to the Audit & Administration Committee meeting; Seconded by Chairwoman Sayegh. All in favor.

Item #7 - FYI/Budgetary Amendment 20A038/Office for Senior Resources/Caregiver Respite Grant through the Field Hall Foundation

Chairwoman Sayegh stated the Field Hall Foundation is a wonderful organization and this grant is for \$15,000.

The meeting was called to order via audio webinar at 6:41 P.M. by Chairwoman Sayegh who lead in the Pledge of Allegiance. Upon roll call Committee Members Addonizio, Albano, and Chairwoman Sayegh were present.

Item #3 – Approval of Minutes – June 16, 2020

The minutes were approved as submitted.

Item #4 – Discussion/COVID-19 Response/Office for Senior Resources Director Michael Cunningham

Office for Senior Resources (OSR) Director Michael Cunningham stated things changed abruptly due to the pandemic, but home delivered meals never stopped. He stated there are 120-150 home delivered meals per day. He stated the safety and health of our seniors has been a major consideration because of their vulnerability. He stated the home delivered meals have been a huge success and a valuable service to the senior of Putnam County. He stated there was an Executive Order by the State to relax the eligibility requirements for this program. He stated OSR is proud of their home delivered meals program because it is unique as it does not contract out the cooking of the meals. He stated the interaction with the drivers delivering the meals is the only contact that some seniors have in day. He told anecdotes of seniors who appreciate the home delivered meals and the connection with the drivers. He noted that loneliness is bad for your health and this has been a difficult period of time. He stated in order to ensure safety, they do minimize face to face contact. He stated they also have “grab and go” meals for seniors who are able to get out of the house. He stated they are providing at least 100 meals per day via the “grab and go” program. He stated OSR has been trying to replace the programs that needed to stop during the pandemic, with others that are almost as good. He stated they have started remote activities, with approximately 43 per week. He stated these programs have been a huge success. He stated these may continue even after the pandemic restrictions are over. He stated wellness calls on seniors have been important, especially with the isolation and loneliness being a problem. He stated they have partnered with the United Way to have food banks for seniors. He stated they have given out approximately 3,000 bags of food to the seniors. He stated OSR also receives produce from Tilly Foster Farm. He stated legal services have been restarted, with precautions in place, as well as medical transportation. He stated OSR is working on a fall prevention outdoor program for September. He stated OSR has also been distributing farmers market coupons to seniors. He stated some important programs have been paused including the unmet needs program partly because seniors have been reluctant to have home health aides come into their homes. He stated OSR has provided animatronic pets to seniors dealing with dementia or Alzheimer’s. He stated OSR has been giving out masks and hand sanitizers. He stated

eventually the Executive Order which relaxed eligibility requirements for home delivered meals will expire and some seniors will no longer be eligible. He stated that is being recognized as a problem across the State. He stated they are trying to figure how they will reopen the senior centers.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated that was a very thorough overview and she appreciates all the hard work that Director Cunningham and OSR do. She stated she knows how happy the seniors are with what the OSR provides.

Director Cunningham stated the OSR staff has been great and have stepped up to deal with the changes.

Chairwoman Sayegh questioned how Tropical Storm Isais effected services.

Director Cunningham stated the severity was not expected. He stated there was no power on Wednesday, but most services resumed on Thursday. He stated they did do wellness check calls on Wednesday.

Chairwoman Sayegh that is great. She stated OSR provides valuable services to the community.

Legislator Addonizio thanked Director Cunningham for his report. She stated many seniors have contacted her in need of the home delivered meals. She stated she cannot thank OSR enough for what they provide.

Director Cunningham stated the Legislators have been some of the best outreach partners.

Legislator Albano thanked Director Cunningham for his efforts.

Chairwoman Sayegh thanked Director Cunningham for his report tonight. She requested he thank his staff for their hard work.

Item #5 – Other Business

a. Approval/Budgetary Amendment 20A045/Fingerprints for Individuals Assigned to the Child Advocacy Center – Required for Accreditation

Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to waive the rules and accept the Other Business, Budgetary Amendment 20A045; Seconded by Legislator Albano. All in favor.

Chairwoman Sayegh stated this is for \$1,068. She stated Social Services Commissioner Michael Piazza provided more information for this requirement, including that the Child Advocacy Center requires employees who will be around children be fingerprinted. She stated fingerprinting and background checks are essential.

Chairwoman Sayegh made a motion to move Budgetary Amendment 20A045 to the Audit & Administration Committee meeting; Seconded by Legislator Addonizio. All in favor.

Dear Public Health Partners,

We are pleased to inform you that Health Research Inc. / New York State Department of Health (HRI/NYSDOH) will be awarding funding totaling \$30M to local health departments (LHDs) for enhanced detection, surveillance and prevention of COVID-19. This funding is part by a CDC sponsored cooperative agreement for Epidemiology and Laboratory Capacity for Infectious Diseases (ELC). CFDA# 93.323.

The attached documents list the individual LHD awards. The awards are based on county populations plus a supplemental award based on percent of COVID-19 cases.

HRI will start emailing contractual agreements this week. The award is for a two-year period, 7/1/20 – 6/30/22 and 75% of the funds are available for expenditure immediately. The contract budget will show the total award, based on the attached allocations, under the Miscellaneous category. This ELC COVID-19 contract will also include emergency placeholder funding in the 'Restricted' budget category in the amount of \$1,000,000. Although the \$1M will be included in the total contract amount, the placeholder funding is not available for expenditure but will allow us to make supplemental awards quickly if additional funding becomes available.

The majority of these funds are expected to be used to increase staffing capacity to conduct rapid and complete case and contact investigations and report data utilizing the CDCMS (CommCare). Budgeting instructions will be sent in a separate email.

Exhibit A - Deliverables
Epidemiology & Laboratory Capacity (ELC) - COVID-19
Capacity Building for Case Investigations and Contact Tracing Coordination
7/1/20 – 6/30/22

Funding is provided to Local Health Departments (LHD) for increased capacity to conduct case and contact investigations. The majority of this funding is expected to support new personnel to strengthen case investigations. Additional staff for coordination of contact investigation and reporting will be eligible under this award. Some funding may be allocated to travel, computers and other miscellaneous expenses in support of staff activities.

Deliverables:

- Increased staffing to conduct rapid and complete case investigations. Case investigation staff must be:
 - reflective of the demographics of the community
 - have experience in public health or clinical services
 - staffing ratios must be appropriate for current case counts and be flexible based on possible variations
 - staffing levels must be appropriate to investigate cases within 24 hours of reporting
- Increased staffing to coordinate contact tracing activities with State contact tracers to ensure contacts are reached within 48 hours of contact elicitation.
- Increase staffing where necessary to ensure contacts have access to testing within three days of initial notification, establish and maintain a current testing protocol within the county, provide transportation and coordination for contacts to be tested, and provide proper reporting in CDCMS of suspect cases/PUIs.
- Ensure daily monitoring of cases and contacts and any social support needs are being met for effective isolation/quarantine.
- Utilize the CDCMS (CommCare) to report all case and contact data.

Reporting Requirements:

CDCMS (CommCare) must be used to report all case and contact data. Data input into this system will be used to report to CDC on all performance measures.

NOTE: The ELC COVID-19 funds are intended to increase public health staffing capacity and cannot supplant existing commitments. Should existing County-funded staff be moved to these funds, their existing position must be backfilled by the County. These funds should result in a net increase of total County public health staff.

Items Accepted: Consumer commodity packaged household products only, inclusive of: Photo chemicals, non-latex driveway sealer, pool chemicals, creosote, kerosene, flammable liquids, metal polish, drain/oven cleaners, rug/upholstery cleaners, wood preservatives, turpentine, stains, varnishes, strippers, thinners, mothballs, rodent poisons, flea powders & collars, bug spray, nail polish remover, hair dyes, hair sprays, gasoline/oil mixtures, brake fluid, antifreeze, auto fluids, pesticides, herbicides, fungicides, chemical fertilizers, adhesives, resins, solvents, oil-based paints, mercury containing products, button cell batteries (from watches and hearing aids), lithium & sealed lead acid batteries, rechargeable batteries, fluorescent light bulbs and tubes, smoke detectors, propane tanks up to 20-pound size, household size quantities of recalled hand sanitizer (methanol tainted).

Items Not Accepted: Industrial or commercial type and/or quantity hazardous waste or reagents, inclusive of: Electronic waste (e-waste), used motor oil, latex paint, plastic bags, tires, unlabeled/undertified containers, household batteries (AAA, AA, C, D, 9V), ammunition, explosives, fireworks, asbestos products, construction debris, furniture, toys or clothing, medical waste, old medications.

ITEMS IN GARBAGE AND/OR LAWN BAGS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

All waste is subject to inspection and will only be accepted in the County's discretion. Please be advised that if any not accepted items as specified above are brought and are determined to present a hazard to residents, workers or the environment, Putnam County reserves the right to take any necessary safety measures, the cost of which shall be the resident's responsibility.
